The Martindale Brightwood Community Development Corporation (MBCDC) team, staff and Board of Directors, are committed to fostering, cultivating and preserving a culture of diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging. Our culture and identity encompass appreciating the visible and invisible qualities of all individuals and expressing respect through trustworthy engagement. Over the past year we have continued to build for sustainability and expansion in and around the Martindale Brightwood community. We renovated and repurposed an outdated, mostly abandoned structure to make it purposeful and to move the needle regarding reviving the 25th and Sherman corridor. Our new facility is not just an office; it is a hub for community engagement and education. With ample room for events and training sessions, we grew our capacity to serve the community and foster meaningful connections. Over 250 partners and residents attended the grand opening of MBCDC new office which was a testament to the cooperative support and enthusiasm that drives our mission. We have set trends of neighborhood organizations owning their own commercial space and created a surge of institutions stepping up to develop affordable housing after we initiated the establishment the first Housing Tax Increment Fund in Martindale Brightwood.

Through resident lead voices we proudly completed the development of the first affordable homes for sale in Brightwood in over two decades. MBCDC's affordable housing strategy and the area demographics have proven to be a catalyst to bring other organizations to the development table to consider contributing to equitable opportunities for homeownership in Martindale Brightwood. Our work is guided by measurable goals and purposeful outcomes, designed to move neighborhoods forward. We are deeply invested in going beyond surface-level interactions with our program participants. Our approach is to delve deeply into their needs and aspirations, striving to create real, lasting change in their lives and trajectories. Thank you, residents and local entities, for your continued support and partnership. Together, we are not just envisioning a brighter future—we are actively building it, one step at a time.

This led to better job opportunities, home ownership, and eventually, the launch of her own business.

In 2023, DeAnna founded, No Excuse Transportation LLC, a non-emergency transportation service. Her inspiration came full circle when she reconnected with Julie Barrett, the program's director, who highlighted the need for transportation assistance for program participants. Eager to give back, DeAnna's business now helps those in need of reliable transportation to job sites and tours. Her story is a powerful

example of how support and opportunity can transform lives. DeAnna's success and dedication to giving back reflect the lasting impact of the YES Program and the boundless potential within us all.

Martindale Brightwood CDC has made tremendous strides in expanding our business development services, thanks to generous grant support from Indianapolis African American Quality of Life Initiative (IAAQL) and Local Initiatives Support Corporation Indianapolis (LISC Indy). These grants have not only empowered MBCDC to invest in the local business ecosystem through training and community building but have also allowed us to strengthen our organizational capacity and better serve entrepreneurs. With these critical resources, MBCDC has created a lasting, positive impact in and around the Martindale Brightwood community.

The IAAQLI grant catapulted our efforts to support Black-owned businesses through training and access to capital. Through this funding, MBCDC hosted pitch contests with larger cash awards as well as provided façade and equipment grants to 12 businesses, enabling them to make significant upgrades to their physical spaces and purchase essential equipment. From mold remediation and new electrical wiring to enhancing food trucks for popular local vendors, these improvements are helping our businesses thrive and better serve their customers.

Small Business Development

A partnership with LISC Indianapolis through a 1year Microenterprise Navigator Program grant has been instrumental in offering personalized support to low-to-moderate income business owners. With the funding, MBCDC hired a business coach that has connected entrepreneurs to critical resources in accounting, marketing, and legal services. In a few short months, Chenille Barrett has earned certification as a GrowthWheel advisor, further enhancing the quality of support we provide. These efforts are a testament to how Martindale Brightwood CDC is leveraging these grants to build a stronger, more resilient community.

Home Repair Program

Safe, affordable housing is vital for good health and well-being. MBCDC helps residents age in place by maintaining housing and offering income-based repairs services, including weatherization and accessibility upgrades. With 75% of Martindale Brightwood homes being over 50 years old, addressing repairs is increasingly urgent amid the affordable housing crisis. In 2023, we added two additional funders to our home repair program: Citizen's Energy Group and Horizon Bank; and we completed essential home repairs for 31 households.



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Real Estate Development

Rural Street Townhomes Update

MBCDC proudly embarked on its first new builds as the sole developer, marking a significant milestone with the Rural Street project. We broke ground in September on two luxury 3-bedroom homes featuring 8-foot ceilings, granite countertops, and 2½ baths, with sale prices starting at \$150,000. This development, the first of its kind in Brightwood in over 20 years, is set to offer six new townhomes, all reserved for households earning at or below 80% of the Area Median Income. Four additional homes are currently under construction, with completion expected by March 2024.

Developed in partnership with the City of Indianapolis through the 2021 LIFT Award, this project includes enhancements such as new stairs, a ramp, and a retaining wall to boost curb appeal for both the homes and the adjacent Heritage Community Garden. The project is supported by funding from Citizens Energy Group ICON loan, Old National Bank Grant, and the Indianapolis Urban League's IAAQLI Grant. This development not only aims to provide quality affordable housing but also focuses on fostering community engagement and ensuring that current residents are not displaced and enabling families to enjoy safe and vibrant living spaces.

Ralston Hills Townhomes Update

After initiating the Martindale Brightwood Hillside Housing Tax Increment Fund (HOTIF) for the area, MBCDC will purchase 14 parcels on one city block. This is the Ralston Hills development project. 26 new homes are planned for the 2000 Block of Ralston Avenue. This initiative aligned with the Vacant to Vibrant theme, taking vacant lots and transforming them into attractive, affordable and vibrant homes for homeownership. The project includes two ADA-compliant ranch-style homes with 2-bedrooms and 2 baths and 22 three-bedroom homes.

The development is planned in phases. Phase One includes, 14 homes, 8 homes starting in 2024, and 6 additional homes slated for 2025. Phase One was awarded the first allocation from the Hillside HOTIF as subsidy for predevelopment or the project. Phase Two includes six additional 3-bedroom townhomes, and two 4-bedroom single family homes. All homes are reserved for households earning at or below 80% of the Area Median Income. Groundbreaking for the 8-unit townhome development is expected in Fall 2024, reflecting our commitment to modernizing this historically marginalized neighborhood while promoting soft density and community inclusion.

Community Education & Engagement

Jumpstart Indy



Celebrating Jumpstart Indy's Second Cohort Graduation

Launched in 2022, Jumpstart Indy empowers residents of inner-city Indiana neighborhoods to become local developers through community-focused real estate training and financing. By increasing local developer capacity and promoting steady growth with a mix of affordable and market-rate housing, Jumpstart Indy offers a sustainable alternative to the "boom and bust" cycle of real estate, safeguarding against gentrification and fostering economic diversity.

Cohort two of Jumpstart Indy concluded in the summer of 2023. Thirty-four students successfully completed the seven-week developer training program. Some had little real estate experience and used this opportunity to learn about the wealth generation potential that real estate investing offers. Others were experienced real estate investors and contractors seeking to form more meaningful connections with their peers and guest speakers.

MBCDC hosted two networking events for Jumpstart Indy alumni. The first event was a reception at Maven's Space following the Indiana Housing Conference, organized in collaboration with Cinnaire. This gathering attracted professionals from across the state and allowed alumni to make valuable connections while applying their newly acquired knowledge. The second event was an end-of-year celebration honoring program facilitators and mentors, providing participants—both past and present -a chance to network with each other and MBCDC community partners. The evening included special recognition for outstanding contributions to the program.













Jumpstart Alumni Secure Federal Funding for Affordable Housing

MBCDC is particularly proud to highlight that two participants from the 2022 cohort, Dwight Cliff of Cliff's Construction and Kevin of Brown Property Brown Development, were awarded over \$400,000 in ARPA funding through the City of Indianapolis' "Vacant to Vibrant" initiative. Both developers were paired with Sib Sheikh, who provided invaluable guidance for underwriting and successful project execution.



Kevin Brown, Brown Property Development Kevin Brown is constructing two new single-family homes in the Martindale-Brightwood neighborhood in partnership with Martindale Brightwood CDC and through ARPA funding. Dwight Cliff is building two new single-family townhomes in the Haughville neighborhood in partnership with the Westside CDC and also utilizing ARPA funding.







All four homes will be sold to families earning up to 80% of the Area Median Income. Both Kevin and Dwight have strategically incorporated and given back to local CDCs through federal funding dollars, demonstrating their commitment to addressing the affordability crisis and positively contributing to their communities. MBCDC is proud of their efforts and achievements, which exemplify how lumpstart can serve as a powerful stepping stone towards success.



HOMEBUYER EDUCATION

In 2023, Martindale Brightwood CDC introduced our free Homebuyer Education course powered by Fifth Third Bank. The 10-hour course used the NeighborWorks, "Realizing the American Dream" curriculum infused with local experts to empower aspiring homeowners with the knowledge and tools necessary to navigate the homebuying process. Topics included budgeting, credit management, mortgage options, and the steps to protect the home with inspections and estate planning. The course contributed to building a stronger, more informed community of potential homeowners, supporting neighborhood stability and growth.



Over 48 community members attended the course
100% of participants reported feeling confident about the process

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SUMMERS IN THE GARDEN SERIES

This year's Summers in the Garden Series brought together community members for six weeks of wellness and sustainability education at the Soul Food Project Farm. Covering diverse topics such as gardening, yoga, mental health, credit education, and sound healing, the series offered participants hands-on experiences and practical knowledge. Each session provided a free lunch and fostered a sense of community, engaging our neighbors from various neighborhoods. The event's success reflects our ongoing commitment to empowering individuals with skills and resources for healthier living, financial wellness, and deeper connections with nature.

COMMUNITY MAINTENANCE

The Martindale Brightwood Community Maintenance program, funded by the United Way Social Innovation grant, supported **senior** residents with home maintenance services like gutter cleaning, lawn care, and pest control. In 2023, **25 households** were served, completing over **200 maintenance projects**, enhancing safety and curb appeal in the community.

FIFTH THIRD BANK MOBILE EMPOWERMENT BUS

This year, the Fifth Third Bank Mobile Empowerment Bus visited Brightwood Plaza, offering essential financial services and workshops to the community. The retrofitted eBus provided attendees with credit checks, mortgage advising, and self-paced financial learning stations. Local partners, including estate attorneys, financial planners, and representatives from the Marion County Treasurer's Office, were available for consultations.

The workshops, which focused on topics such as budgeting, debt management, and identity protection, helped equip community members with tools for financial empowerment. The event demonstrated the continued commitment to providing accessible resources for financial education and support.












2023 Financials


In 2023, MBCDC continued to make significant strides across multiple sectors, including employment services, business development, community engagement, education, home repair, and homeownership. Our mission-driven work was supported by a total income of \$3,092,292, with the majority (91%) coming from grants and supplemented by contributions, fundraising, and other revenue sources.

Moving forward, MBCDC will continue to strengthen its impact by addressing both the housing and economic needs of the community, creating sustainable pathways to homeownership and employment for the residents of Martindale Brightwood.


